'Good News' from Catherine, former School Chaplain

We are blessed to have two Methodist Primary Schools in our Circuit. Over the past few months, both schools have received recognition in different ways for the remarkable educational, social and nurturing environments they provide.

On Thursday 9th May, Bedford Hall was inspected by SIAMS (Statutory Inspection of Anglican and Methodist Schools) which focusses on assessing the effectiveness of the school's distinctive Christian vision in enabling pupils and adults to flourish. The report was published after half-term and the school has been awarded 'Excellent' - a tribute to the hard work of all staff and the senior leadership team as well as a reflection of the strong links school has with members of Bedford Methodist Church. Soon after the news from Bedford, it was announced on 19th June that Westleigh Methodist has been chosen as one of five schools from around the country to receive 'Silver' - Primary School of the Year, Pearson Teaching Awards 2019. A number of the stories heard by the judges demonstrated the support given by Hindley Green Methodist and our Circuit to individual families in crisis as well as

support shown by the wider community following the fire at school in March 2018.

The 'Gold' winner from the five shortlisted schools will be announced in October at a televised ceremony in London. Watch this space!

AMPLEFORTH - FRIDAY 28th to 30th JUNE 2019

Four cars and occupants – there was 13 from Leigh and Hindley Circuit - set off, at different times, in happy anticipation of their week-end at Ampleforth Abbey. Three cars arrived without incident, however the fourth car was involved in an unforeseen and dangerous drama with the driver, Joyce, emerging as the Heroine of Sutton Bank – the details of which would take up the whole of the Circuit Newsletter!!

Ampleforth is huge with Abbey, school (although quite separate) and extensive grounds, but the overall atmosphere is one of quiet and unworldliness, which had a calming effect on everyone.

The group, who had arrived, met for refreshments with a welcome and introduction by Father Christopher, who was friendly and informative about facilities available. Vespers were at 6.00 p.m. in the Abbey followed by a substantial supper and everyone went to Compline (which was now referred to as Complan) at 8.15 p.m. Before the main services bells *boomed* out for 10 minutes, quieter bells rang for shorter services. Quiet was encouraged from 10.30 p.m. and as bedrooms were very comfortable, most of the group were ready for a good night's sleep.

Saturday – Matins at 6.00 a.m. followed by Lauds 7.30 a.m. There was an extensive breakfast at 8.00 a.m. and Little Hour at 8.45 a.m. with some of the services in Latin. At 10.15 a.m. there was a session on Benedictine Spirituality by Father Paul. Everyone attended and were delighted as he proved to be extremely funny and bore no resemblance to the austere monk who was first seen at the previous services. Father Paul gave the history of Ampleforth and the Benedictine Order with enthusiasm and humour which was captivating. After coffee there was a session by Vivienne on the theme of Grace. Another service in the Abbey and then lunch!

Saturday afternoon was scheduled as 'free time' however everyone agreed we should ask Father Paul for a tour of the Abbey – which proved every bit as entertaining and informative as his previous talk. Vivienne showed us round the Crypt as she had been to Ampleforth several times. Refreshments then Vespers at 6.00 p.m. Supper at 6.30 p.m. followed by Evening Reflection and 'Complan' at 8.15 p.m. There was now a chance for the group to relax together with nibbles etc.

Sunday – a repeat of the services on Saturday with breakfast at 8.30 a.m. The group joined Vivienne for a session at

9.30 a.m. and then Mass and Holy Communion at 11.00 a.m. in the Abbey with members of the general public also attending. The Monks were in white robes, quite different from the black habits their usual garb. The Abbot conducted the service which was very affecting, with an air of reverence and a great deal of incense. There were three hymns and we Methodists thoroughly enjoyed the final hymn 'For all the Saints'. Following the hour long service everyone was invited to join the Monks for coffee, they had reverted to their block habits and chatted happily to



everyone. Vivienne conducted Holy Communion, in the lounge, as the group had not taken Holy Communion during Mass but had received a blessing from the Abbot. Roast dinner at 1.15 p.m. The group then began to disperse - the Heroine of Sutton Bank had to remain, with Maureen, till Monday to collect her car with new clutch! Everyone agreed that Ampleforth had been a wonderful experience, friendships had been made and strengthened, and all hoped the overall calming effect of Ampleforth could be carried forward into the busy week ahead.
