REV ANDREW'S MESSAGE –

"Don't waste a crisis" 2

Today is the birthday of the Church, the outpouring of the Holy Spirit gave new utterance to the people of God, inspired, encouraged, emboldened the new followers of Jesus rose up and shared the gospel – and three thousand were added to their number that day. Yet, I like so many other Presbyters and Pastors celebrate when one long attended worshipper decides to become a member!

"They devoted themselves to the apostles' teaching and to fellowship, to the breaking of bread and to prayer..... and the Lord added to their number daily those who were being saved."

Daily he added to their number – why, well I believe it was because of this devotion to the apostles' teaching, to fellowship, to the breaking of bread to prayer, to this communal sharing, that the Lord added to their number. The adding to their number is an act of God not of people, it is God alone who works through the hearts of men and women, all we are required to do is to worship God and make disciples.

I was interested in an article that I read recently which discussed the merits or otherwise of physical meetings "...we spend years developing individual expertise, knowledge and insight, then take decisions in forums that make us collectively stupid. A leading academic in this field, has studied thousands of meetings. How do people interact? Do decisions reflect the breadth of knowledge in the room? The evidence is as clear as it is depressing, as the academic puts it "Meetings predict bad outcomes more powerfully than smoking predicts cancer""

Sobering reading and research when you consider the number of meetings that church members and church leaders attend , when you look at the agenda items of any church meeting, it's little wonder or maybe hardly surprising to find our churches struggling in so many ways. One of the blessings of this coronavirus has been the removal of physical meetings. Though it takes us a long time to get used to it, and then to find better ways of meeting – the online meetings do have the capacity to be places where real discussion and debate can be held, though they need to be managed incredibly well, and we're just not geared up for that at the moment. Look out for the "how to lead good virtual meetings" training from the learning network. (You heard it here first.)

Now of course, I can't imagine in a million years that we shall get very far with virtual meetings, but it does raise the real pressing question of the true value of our meetings and may be a time to take stock of what we really ought to be spending out time talking about.

So, what do we need to be talking about? (In my view)

Jesus said – "I will build my Church," and we know that in many places within our locality and nationally and indeed internationally he is doing precisely that.

At the Methodist Conference in 2011 – yes 9 years ago! The Revd Dr Martyn Atkins - "As disciples of Jesus we are called to become the Church God wants us to be," said Dr Atkins. "This will involve making some tough decisions. We don't have all the resources we would like to have but God has not given up on us. We must work hard to become a Church that demonstrates our faith through a commitment to justice and serving our local, national and international communities."

On property, Dr Atkins said: "We unquestionably have too many church buildings: too many in the wrong places, too many unfit to sustain our life as a discipleship movement shaped for mission today. We too readily associate the sustaining of the life of our chapels with the work of God's kingdom - these often overlap but they're not the same thing.

A more sacrificial, strategic approach is needed. Our churches must not exist simply to perpetuate the status quo, but to provide a place where people can come to faith and be nurtured in their journey with Christ."

What our enforced lockdown has taught us and has brought from us is a renewed strength to meet the needs of our community at this time, a renewed and focussed energy to be the people of God today – to listen and to study, to worship and to pray in new meaningful ways that have been lost with our propensity of seeing church as being first and foremost what **we** do in **our** building.

The first thing in my mind is for the Church is to take risks. To have that long hard and difficult conversation in the local church and determine whether it truly has a mission, and I don't mean a half-hearted 'save this church' mission, but a very serious conversation about individual church sustainability – and ask the difficult question. As you come out of this enforced lock down, ask yourself why do we want to open the church doors – what is your mission?

I want you to imagine that you are considering opening a new church on your current site, what would be the reason for doing so?

- What, in **prayer** has God placed on your heart, to what have you been led?
- What plans, ideas would you have in place, to whom are you seeking to demonstrate your **presence** what activities and events are you going to put on to draw people in?
- How are you going to **proclaim** the gospel to the people in your orbit as they too come out of the chains of lockdown, with their worries and fears, how does the gospel you're planning to proclaiming speak to them today?
- What is your means of **persuasion**, to encourage them to consider a life with Christ?

The first thing each and every church needs to do as it emerges is to re-evaluate its very reason for its existence, because it's a huge commitment of resources and energy, Jesus will indeed build his church, and by the power of the Holy Spirit many will be added to the number of believers, but will he do it where you are, is it his church to do with as he pleases, or is it your little oasis a peace of security and friendship?

MONIES:-

Culcheth & Glazebury Community Day should have taken place on 8th May and the Auction on 25th April but were understandably cancelled. Usually the combined income from just these 2 events would have been at least \pounds 2,000!

As Social Distancing is likely to with us for some considerable time it's not likely that events like this will be able to take place in the near future, never mind being able to physically attend worship together. Unfortunately, we are somewhat reliant on these types of events, not forgetting the weekly 'collection' to help pay for the running costs of the church and the quarterly assessment to the Circuit which allows us to have a Minister. Currently we have a large shortfall of income.

The Methodist Conference will meet virtually this year

The Conference Business Committee met last week and agreed that the Conference should meet June 25 – July 2 2020 in order to conduct its essential business. The committee recognised that the restrictions that are likely still to be in place at the end of June mean that a virtual meeting is necessary. The committee was encouraged by the experience of the Council when it met virtually at the end of March.

Final details about the timetable are being discussed and there will be further communication with all those attending after the Council has met on 16 May.

We are particularly mindful of those for whom this is a significant Conference personally (eg ordinands and those designated for office) and hope that the Methodist people will keep them and all the representatives in their prayers.
