The Headteacher, Mrs Burkes, gave an introduction on the theme of the morning -'Christian Values' - explaining one aspect of how the school promotes their Christian ethos by each class having a "Reflection Area", giving the children access to a guiet space, which encompasses a reading area, a prayer space and activities around their class Christian Value.Starting with the 2 and 3 year old Nursery through to Year 6, the children, guided by their teacher, gave wonderful presentations of some of their work on the Christian Value they had been studying. These values included love, team work, forgiveness, equality, thankfulness, peace, generosity and justice. Some had recorded singing - others had written some very touching and meaningful prayers. There was artwork, class presentations and conversations by video and views on how to tackle world peace. The school had chosen two Christian songs and we all joined in with the actions and the school choir was there to guide us and contributed two of their own songs. The head girl and boy read bible passages. Another aspect of good news to share is that this was an opportunity to be introduced to the newly appointed Schools Chaplain, Catherine Preece, who had been invited to come along to the service where she ably assisted Revd Vivienne who, in her closing words, showed us all how NOT to bake a cake! This caused a great deal of hilarity with the children joining in to mix the ingredients, but the message was clear.

This was a most joyous occasion, truly reflecting the Christian Values taught in school and we pray that our relationship between school and church continues to grow and strengthen.

Hindley Green Methodist Church

Sunday the 7th January 2018 was the 40th Anniversary of Hindley Green Methodist Church.

A Methodist Church has been a significant place of worship in Hindley Green since 1855 when our forefathers had a vision to build a church on Leigh Road. This was Brunswick Methodist Church, Day School and Sunday School and was built on land across the road from the present building. In 1906 a red brick church (Brunswick) was erected on the current site, with the Sunday School and Day School remaining across the road. On its demolition in 1977 it was decided that a new church be built on this site and re-named Hindley Green Methodist Church, to unite the former Brunswick and Bethel Churches. Hindley Green Methodist Church was dedicated on the 7th January, 1978.To commemorate our anniversary, we held a Celebration Service and invited past members and friends to attend. Revd Mary Jones led the service and Revd Derek Heritage, former superintendent of the Hindley Circuit, took part in the service as did Mrs. Joan Shaddick, wife of one of our former ministers.

Ms Phoebe Atkinson, our most long-standing member shared reminiscences of the Brunswick Church and

Stuart Sephton shared memories of Hindley Green Methodist Church, which he had attended all his younger life, together with his parents Mavis and Ken. His 12 year old daughter, Olivia also read a lesson. It was lovely to have new members of our congregation and their families present to take part in this joyful occasion. This rich service of worship, memories, thanksgiving and hope for the future and to see the church so full again with so many Christian voices singing in praise, was such a wonderful experience.

A buffet lunch was shared after the service and photographs of the many events were circulated as well as being shown on the new AV system and this provoked so much fun and laughter. It really was an anniversary to remember but one which encouraged us to look forward to our future in God's hands.
